JOONDALUP HEALTH CAMPUS

Joondalup Health Campus (JHC) is the largest hospital in Perth's northern corridor with over 650 beds including the standalone 145-bed private hospital. Our staff treat public and private patients. We have been contracted by the State Government to treat public patients since 1996 – one of the longest such contracts in Australia.

JHC is managed by Ramsay Health Care – Australia's largest and most respected private hospital operator. In Western Australia, Ramsay Health Care also operates Hollywood Private Hospital, Attadale Private Hospital, Glengarry Private Hospital and Peel Health Campus.

Ramsay Health Care holds a 20-year contract to provide a range of services to public patients. This contract, which is managed by the WA Department of Health's North Metropolitan Health Service (NMHS), specifies an annual maximum operating budget for required levels of activity and the services to be provided to public patients. The contract is set to be extended by 10 years to 2028.

We are funded for activity or for each patient treated. This funding model, which has been in place since 1996, provides value for taxpayers as we are only paid for the patients we treat. A similar model is now being rolled out across all the nation's public hospitals. Under our contract, we are required to report regularly to the WA Department of Health's North Metropolitan Health Service (NMHS) on a range of performance indicators such as waiting times, safety and complaints. We are also required to meet the same or higher standards than the State's public hospitals.

The Department of Health's Licensing and Accreditation Regulatory Unit inspects facilities, staffing and equipment annually. Independent auditors, appointed by the NMHS, review our coding, invoicing, activity, quality, staffing, reporting, management of asset administration and a range of other indicators nominated by the NMHS each year. JHC has consistently performed well in each year of review.

We offer services to public and private patients. We are fortunate to have some of WA's top specialists working at JHC. In March 2013, we took our service to private patients to a new level with the opening of the first new private hospital in the northern suburbs for over 33 years.

CEO UPDATE

It's been another busy year for JHC as we once again work to meet the ever-growing demand for hospital services as the population in Perth's Northern corridor continues to grow.

Our recently completed redevelopment has delivered extensive new facilities for public and private patients including:

- The Wanneroo Wing (L Block) with 85 additional beds

The Emergency Department received more than 93,000 presentations in 2013/14 making it one of the busiest in Australia.

More than 2,700 people now work at JHC. Many have worked here for a number of years and some have been here since the hospital first opened as Wanneroo Hospital in 1980. I was very pleased to honour some of these dedicated staff members in May 2014 at our annual Loyalty Awards. Over 130 employees were recognised for service milestones and special honours were given to six staff, affectionately known as 'JHC Royalty', who have worked at the hospital for more than 30 years.

We're expanding hospital services for the children of Perth's northern suburbs by constructing a new paediatric ward on top of the existing public hospital building. The 37-bed facility is funded by way of an exciting new partnership between the Channel 7 Telethon Trust, the Western Australian State Government and Ramsay Health Care. Construction of the new Telethon Children's Ward is set to start in 2015.

In the meantime, the Paediatric Department at JHC, in association with the Telethon Kids Institute, is preparing for the ORIGINS Project, a new study involving pregnant mothers and their babies from the Joondalup Wanneroo catchment area. This is a new birth cohort study, designed to collect detailed information about how the early environment influences the risk of a broad range of diseases. It has the potential to deliver enormous benefits to the local community, and indeed the wider community.

In March 2014 we saw our new Joondalup Private Hospital celebrate its first anniversary. The 145-bed facility is the first new private hospital to open in the northern suburbs in over 30 years and offers an extensive range of inpatient services including obstetrics, surgery, rehabilitation, medical and acute age care across five levels.

In May 2014, JHC cardiac specialists performed the first procedure of its kind in WA, implanting the world's smallest cardiac monitor into patients who experience an irregular heartbeat. Arrhythmia, or heart rhythm disease, affects high numbers of Australians who often go undiagnosed, with potentially fatal results. The Insertable Cardiac Monitor (ICM) aims to disarm the 'ticking time bomb' for those Australians, and works to detect even the minutest changes in a patient's heart rhythm. as we saw the sad passing of our chairman and founder of Ramsay Health Care, Paul Ramsay AO, who passed away in May 2014. We were lucky enough to be visited by Paul at JHC on numerous occasions since becoming part of Ramsay Health Care in 2005, and Paul liked nothing more than touring the hospital and talking to staff across all levels of the organisation.

It has been a time for farewells

2014 was the 50th anniversary of the founding of Ramsay Health Care, with the opening of Mr Ramsay's first private hospital in Sydney, Australia. From these early beginnings, he went on to establish Ramsay Health Care, which is today, not only the largest private hospital group in Australia, but a global hospital group operating health care facilities across the world.

Under his good guidance, JHC, along with the rest of the Ramsay Health Care hospitals focus on maintaining the highest standards of quality and safety, being an employer of choice and operating the business according to 'The Ramsay Way' philosophy: People Caring for People.

We are very proud of the achievements of the past year and we look forward to continuing towards our vision of *growing with our community to provide excellent health care.*

PLANS FOR NEW PAEDIATRIC WAR ANNOUNCEE



Joondalup Health Campus is expanding hospital services for children by constructing top of the existing public

The 37-bed facility is funded by the Channel 7 Telethon Trust, the Western Australian State Government and hospital operator Ramsay Health Care. Construction of the new Telethon Children's Ward is set to start in 2015 and take approximately 18 months to complete.

The new Telethon Children's Ward will be a purpose-built facility for the children of Perth's northern corridor. The ward will be family friendly with play areas for children and overnight facilities for parents. With a floor to ceiling glass surround, the ward will feel bright and spacious and every room will have spectacular views over Lake Joondalup or towards the Indian Ocean.

The Telethon Children's Ward will replace the existing 24-bed paediatric unit and pave the way for Joondalup Health Campus to become the northern hub of the State Government's expanding paediatric services.

This new ward will enable more children to be treated at Joondalup Health Campus instead of travelling into the city for treatment.

The facility will complement the recently-opened paediatric emergency department which has seen a 56 percent increase in

The new Telethon Children's Ward includes:

- 19 beds in single rooms
- 4 beds in double rooms for patients requiring observation
- 3 beds in a triple room for patients requiring observation
- 1 bed in an isolation room for infectious patients
- 10 bed day procedure unit
- Overnight facilities for parents
- Activity areas for children
- Administration areas for clinicians.

The announcement of the new paediatrics ward was made by WA Premier The Hon Mr Colin Barnett at Joondalup Health Campus in May 2014.

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"The State Government is delighted to partner with Telethon WA and Ramsay Health Care to deliver this presentations over the past five years. new 37-bed paediatric ward, which will provide a significant boost to our paediatric capacity," Mr Barnett said.

PREPARATIONS UNDERWAY IN PAEDIATRIC DEPARTMENT FOR THE ORIGINS PROJECT

In association with the Telethon Kids Institute, the Paediatric team at Joondalup Health Campus is preparing for the ORIGINS Project, a new study involving pregnant mothers and their babies from the Joondalup Wanneroo catchment area.

This is a new birth cohort study, designed to collect detailed information about how the early environment influences the risk of a broad range of diseases.

The study will involve the collection of data on mothers' health, diet, physical activity and other environmental factors as well as the collection of appropriate specimens. Infants will be followed up to assess how these early life exposures influence the child's growth and development.

The City of Joondalup has been chosen because there is a prevalence of non-communicable (noninfectious) diseases in the population, including diabetes, heart disease, cancer, asthma and mental health problems.

The recruitment of all women who aim to deliver at JHC will soon begin from the GP surgeries and JHC's Antenatal Clinic. There are more than 3,000 deliveries per year at JHC, and over the course of five years the study aims to collect data from more than 10,000 mothers and infants during standard clinical care and to invite as many of these women as possible to consent to a more active follow-up.

The ORIGINS Project is one of the Telethon Kids Institute's six showcase projects. Showcase projects are a demonstration of a new way of working – one that's highly collaborative, involves the community, and pledges to deliver real outcomes within a defined period of time. Showcase projects involve working across disciplines with people outside the research sector such as those in policy, practice and the families who care for kids.

MEDICAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE

he Heads of Department Medical Advisory Committee (HoDMAC) is the formal organisational structure through which accredited practitioners formulate and communicate their collective views.

HoDMAC consists of one representative of each department and met six times between 1 July 2013 and 30 June 2014.

The committee's objectives are to:

- Provide a means for practitioners to participate in the policy-making and planning processes of the hospital.
- Advise the Chief Executive Officer of appropriate policies for the clinical organisation of the hospital.
- Participate in the planning, development and implementation of quality programs of the hospital.
- Assist in identifying the health needs of the community and advising the Chief Executive Officer on appropriate services.

- Review recommendations of the Hospital Credentials Committee for credentialing of practitioners.
- Consult with Heads of Departments to ensure satisfactory on-call or availability arrangements.
- Ensure accredited practitioners comply with JHC bylaws.

In addition to continuing the above roles, the HoDMAC oversaw a number of new initiatives during the last 12 months. These have included:


- Contributing to the growth of Joondalup Private Hospital.
- Assisting with achievement of the National Safety and Quality in Health Care Standards for the 2014 accreditation survey period.
- Contributing to the planning of the redevelopment of the new paediatric ward.
- Monitoring and planning for the constantly growing demand for beds, equipment, other facilities and staff as the population of the northern suburbs continues to grow.

Another regular item on the agenda is the key performance statistics relating to the core activities of the hospital. These include measurements such as how quickly patients in the Emergency Department are attended to, waiting times for elective surgery and patient length of stay.

HoDMAC works through a range of operational and governance items, including Mortality and Morbidity governance, quality reviews and overseeing the subcommittees.



On 11 September, JHC celebrated R U OK? Day and highlighted this important day of action with balloons, posters, merchandise, signage and a free morning tea for staff. Staff were encouraged to shine a light on mental health and initiate caring conversations with colleagues, friends and family by simply asking "Are you okay?"

JHC's 'can do' culture is stronger than ever, according to the results of the hospital-wide **Staff Culture Survey** conducted in September. A record-breaking 1,779 people participated in the organisational culture survey which measured 'how we do things around here'. The results show a 10 per cent improvement in positive and constructive behaviours across the hospital compared with the previous survey in 2011. This is a very pleasing result especially because the hospital workforce of staff and clinicians has grown dramatically since 2011 from approximately 2,000 to over 2,600. In fact, 565 people completed the survey for the first time in 2013.

A growing body of international evidence shows hospital culture has a significant impact on patient safety and quality of care as well as overall hospital performance. By actively managing our culture, we aim to create a culture where staff are engaged, teams work cooperatively and patients receive excellent care.

October was a very busy month for community engagement with JHC actively supporting a number of major community initiatives.

JHC once again proudly supported the West Coast Institute of Training's Annual Awards Evening by sponsoring the Trainee of the Year award.

JHC Deputy CEO Diane Jones presented the award to Lisa Collyer, a student who completed a Horticulture Traineeship with Kings Park and Botanic Gardens. As part of her traineeship Lisa completed a Certificate III in Horticulture, where she gained the practical skills and knowledge required in the horticulture industry. Lisa plans on cultivating her passion for growing and maintaining flora at Kings Park and Botanic Gardens and has now started her Certificate IV in Horticulture which will give her the skills to develop and coordinate specialist horticulture programs.

Since late April 2014 JHC has been screening for stroke patients to participate in the national Very Early Rehabilitation in Speech (VERSE) project – Australia's largest clinical trial in aphasia rehabilitation in stroke.

Patients affected by the loss of language ability – aphasia – following a stroke can find recovery very challenging. Aphasia has been shown to benefit greatly from very early intervention and therapy with positive results shown in previous studies. The VERSE project further investigates the benefits of very early aphasia intervention in stroke recovery and will study the effects of intensive therapy at 12 weeks and 26 weeks post-stroke. Results of the project are due to be released early 2016.





The new 145-bed Joondalup Private Hospital turned one, celebrating its first year of operation.


On 6 June 2013, Joondalup Private Hospital was officially opened by Joondalup Health Campus CEO Kempton Cowan, Ramsay Health Care managing director Chris Rex and Minister for Health Hon Dr Kim Hames MLA. People with private health insurance living in Perth's northern corridor have now been able to enjoy the new option of Joondalup Private Hospital instead of having to travel 30kms into the city for treatment. Following the construction of the new hospital, 70 private beds that were previously located within the public hospital were able to be handed over from Ramsay Health Care to the state as additional public beds.





Joondalup Health Campus has expanded through our redevelopment to deliver extensive new facilities and expanded services for public and private patients. Construction commenced in September 2009 with completion in 2013. Here are the highlights over the years of our exciting redevelopment project.

Expanded Mental Health Unit with 42 beds including 10 secure beds providing Level 6 care to patients with serious mental illness.

Funded through savings made throughout the redevelopment we were able to create an expanded Special Care Nursery with 16 neonatal cots - twice as many as before providing care to premature babies.

State-of-the art facilities for one of Australia's busiest Emergency Departments with 56

bays and separate facilities for adults and children for the first time.

New ward block with 85 additional beds - almost all in spacious single rooms accommodating aged care, rehabilitation and surgical patients.

12 operating theatres including four state-of-the-art iSuites with digital surgery technology and two endoscopy procedure rooms.

A 9-bed Intensive Care Unit, 6-bed High Dependency Unit and a 10-bed Coronary Care Unit providing Level 5 care.

A new medical imaging centre opened next to the new Emergency Department, providing high quality radiology services to patients.

Funded by Ramsay Health Care, the Cardiac Catheter Lab provides interventional cardiology services to public and private patients.

Joondalup Private Hospital | 2013 Joondalup's first standalone private hospital with 145 beds providing aged care and rehabilitation, obstetrics, surgery and general medicine services.

Purpose-built facilities dedicated to training the doctors, nurses and allied health professionals of the future. The Community Clinical School is part of a unique partnership between Ramsay Health Care, Curtin University, Edith Cowan University, the University of Western Australia and the Federal Government.

Additional specialist consulting suites over three floors, more than doubling the number of consulting suites on the campus.

Also funded through savings made throughout the redevelopment, this new \$3.5m facility replaces the clinic off Regents Park Road and includes a spacious waiting room, 12 individual consulting rooms and two interview rooms.

Sharing the facilities with the new Antenatal Clinic, the After Hours GP Clinic replaces

main public reception.

Since early 2014, JHC staff have enjoyed access to on-site child care with a new dedicated facility. Independently operated by Ngala, the 72 place long day care centre provides care to children aged 0-6 years. The new facility underpins JHC's commitment to providing a family-friendly workplace with a vacation care service also provided during the school holidays.

Joondalup Health Campus serves one of the fastest growing regions of Australia – the local population of 340,000 is projected to grow to more than 500,000 by 2020. The recent redevelopment delivered extensive new facilities for public and private patients and enabled the hospital to catch up with its rapidly growing community. But with thousands moving into the area each week, further expansion is already underway.

Construction of a new 37-bed paediatric ward – on top of the existing public hospital – is set to start in early 2015 and take just one year. The facility is funded by Telethon7, the State Government and Ramsay Health Care and will replace the existing paediatric ward. See page 6 for more information.

The on-site renal dialysis unit will relocate to upgraded and larger premises within the hospital in 2015. The expansion from 8 to 12 chairs will enable more patients to undergo their regular dialysis locally.

TRAININGAND DEVELOPMENT



With this aim in mind, staff within the unit nurses completed the hospital's general analyse the learning needs of colleagues and provide a range of programs to meet these needs. These range from the hospital's comprehensive orientation and mandatory training programs through to advanced clinical skill programs. Clinical enhancement programs are also offered to nurses wishing to expand their skills in emergency, critical care, perioperative care, mental health and paediatrics.

The unit is comprised of staff educators with extensive industry knowledge in both clinical and non-clinical roles and is supported by a network of staff development nurses who work in clinical areas providing education to frontline colleagues.

The Training and Development unit also assists staff with accessing other educational opportunities not provided within the campus via our external study leave process. During 2013-14, there were 1,986 hours of external study leave granted to staff. Offering these experiences creates the opportunity for enhanced knowledge and skills to be returned to the health campus, ensuring best practice which ultimately leads to improved patient outcomes.

JHC provides training for GPs who undertake remote anaesthetics either for the whole year or as upskilling programs for one to two weeks for GPs who are currently in the country but who wish to maintain skills that aren't taught in their practice area. Out of house training for WA based doctors also includes week long courses as preparation for anaesthesia speciality exams.

Employment pathways for new nurses and undergraduate nursing students are also a focus of the unit. During 2013-14, there were 738 undergraduate nursing student placements and 44 registered

graduate program, 41 of whom continued deliver a mandatory online orientation to work at JHC. An additional 29 registered nurse graduates commenced their program in 2014. Also in 2013-14, 61 enrolled nurses completed their graduate program and all continued employment at JHC. An additional 37 enrolled nurses commenced their training in 2014. JHC also supports a number of nursing students through Postgraduate Certificate, educational material. Diploma and Masters level studies.

Partnerships with metropolitan, country and interstate universities as well as local TAFE Colleges and private providers have seen JHC continue to support undergraduate students of nursing, allied health and medicine in gaining their practical experiences.

In July 2013 we opened our \$17 million Community Clinical School. The school is part of a unique partnership between Ramsay Health Care, the Federal Government, the University of Western Australia, Curtin University and Edith Cowan University. The clinical school is located alongside the new Joondalup Private Hospital and includes the JHC Clinical Library, lecture theatres, offices and meeting rooms.

Our training programs have always allowed undergraduate and postgraduate doctors, nurses and allied health professionals to experience a unique mix of treating public and private patients within a single hospital. Having the onsite Clinical School has now taken this relationship to a new level, providing new training facilities for students and fostering links with people who may well become our future employees.

Learning programs offered by the Training and Development unit continue to grow and develop in line with our staff's ever changing training needs. In conjunction

with the Ramsay Training Institute, we program for all new staff to complement our in-house, personally delivered orientation sessions. Our regular programs related to mandatory competencies and clinical skill development have been maintained and are continually improving and including new areas of learning such as mental health and Resus for Kids

Increased frequency of the Deteriorating Patient Simulation workshops have been implemented to complement the Deteriorating Patient theoretical study day available for all disciplines.

New educational opportunities for 2014 include introducing the Human Factors, Human Errors training available to all disciplines with a multi-disciplinary team of staff involved in the facilitation and teaching on the day.

Inter-professional learning opportunities have been supported by continuing to develop networks with medical and allied health practitioners who both attend and present in our learning programs.

We continue to ensure our learning programs are accessible to nursing and medical staff working within the wider health community. Nursing staff employed within the Ramsay Health Care group and through nursing agencies or nursing homes from the local community participate regularly in our learning programs. We also continue to support the local community through opportunities of work experience for local high school students via our Next Gen high school program.
